Evangelii Gaudium

In our world, ordained ministers and other pastoral workers can make present the fragrance of Christ's closeness and his personal gaze. The Church will have to initiate everyone – priests, religious and laity - into this "art of accompaniment" which teaches us to remove our sandals before the sacred ground of the other (cf. Exodus 3:5). The pace of this accompaniment must be steady and reassuring, reflecting our closeness and our compassionate gaze which also heals, liberates and encourages growth in the Christian life (169).

"Many [have] pointed to the shortage of qualified people devoted to accompaniment. Belief in the theological and pastoral value of listening entails rethinking and renewing the ways that priestly ministry is ordinarily exercised, and reviewing its priorities. The Synod also recognized the need to train consecrated persons and laypeople, male and female, to accompany young people (244).

What is intentional about our accompaniment?

- As part of Some Definite Service, the diocesan-wide approach to parish growth supported through local people, plans and prayer, we are experiencing and offering accompaniment as the norm.
- To do this effectively, we require:
 - Knowledge of the other
 - Knowledge of the desired outcome for the other
 - Skill in listening to the other AND the voice of the Lord
 - Time (cf. EG 222-223) & a willingness to put aside personal preferences
- Essentially, we require: Direction, Docility and Detachment



The 3 Ds

Direction

- What is the current situation?
- What is the destination?
- What might be the steps to take us there?

Docility

• How is the Lord speaking to us (in prayer before, during the conversation and in reflection on the interaction)?

Detachment

 How might I leave aside my preferences and preconceptions?





The hourglass: Intentional Accompaniment Model

The first task is to ascertain conversion to Jesus Christ and if not present, that is your direction.

Thereafter, helping the other to deepen their faith (holiness) and appreciate their role in spreading the faith (mission).

Whatever the ministry of the apostolate, this sense of direction is so helpful.





A Parish in view; understanding where we come from.

1-4 weeks of Baptism.

Preparation in between Sunday Masses / Saturday Morning.

Assumption of the faith of parents/carers.

Focus on the Liturgical Rites.

Short prayer.

Inevitability of None Practice.


Exclusive focus on the parent's/carers desire for their children.

Intentional Accompaniment: A different way.

Accompaniment is not simply a matter of remaining near to others, but above all of helping to point them towards Jesus in the context of an authentic human relationship.

Rather than speak first about the programme, seek to ignite interest in the person, life, and character of Jesus.





Shifting the Focus from Child to Parent.

The shift in Baptismal Preparation from the child to the parent enables us to focus on helping the parents to become open to the possibility of a relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ for themselves. Without this, **Baptism becomes a Sacramentalising moment, and not an evangelising** one. Without a personal relationship with the Lord, they cannot be the :"first educators in the faith"

Each family who attends Baptism Preparation is linked with another family in the parish who is living an intentional Christian life. This is an informal way of connecting people to those who can share something of their life and journey to the Lord. The person on the threshold of conversion begins to know the Church. On the Sunday before the Baptism, the family is welcomed to meet the Community at the Sunday Mass.

- Praying with others.


