'Light radiates from a single slender candle on a table set in a bare, darkened room. Piercing the cold darkness with radiant light, the candle frame warms the faces of three men huddled over the table, which is covered in plain line and graced only by a plate of meat. A playful dog seeks the attention of the bearded man on the left, while a boy on the right, plate in hand, pauses in rapt attention to listen in. The room and the table may be simple, but this is no ordinary meal. It is the supper at Emmaus, shared by the Risen Jesus and two disciples after their long walk together.'

'As we reflect...we step into the story of this extraordinary meal at Emmaus. Into the darkness of the evening hour the disciples carry their physical exhaustion from their long walk. They also bring to the table, in their hearts and minds, their deep disappointment and spiritual anguish over the suffering and death of Jesus, their Teacher and Lord. '

Light

- chiaroscuro 'an artistic technique of using sharp contrasts of light and shadow to create a dramatic effect - to express the spiritual intensity of the moment'.
- 'We see Jesus with broken bread, a piece in each hand. His eyes looks up to
 heaven in a gesture of blessing as his serene face, illuminated by the candle,
 rivets the eyes of the disciples and the serving girl. Their eyes direct our gaze to
 Jesus. The warm light evokes the spiritual illumination of the moment: the light
 of God's love dispels the world's darkness.'
- Note the dancing flame Christ the Light of the World is risen.

Eucharistic Amazement

This is a 'dramatic moment of "Eucharistic Amazement" as the disciples raise their hands in astonished recognition of Jesus in the breaking of the bread. Their journey to Emmaus was a pilgrimage, through word and sacrament, of faith in the abiding presence of Jesus with them. This is the same presence that continues in the Church in every age and place, for every Mass, with its liturgy of the word and liturgy of the Eucharist, invites us to the same table of the Lord, where our hearts burn in the sacred presence of Jesus. And our communion with the Body and Blood of Jesus

deepens the graces we received at our baptism.

You are invited

Notice how the scene opens into our space with an empty place at the table. The artist invites us to take our place at the table of the Lord, who desires to stay with us and to nourish us with his own divine life and love as we make our way on the path of life.

Colour

Christ wears red and blue symbolising his divinity (blue) and humanity (red). He is dressed in red and wrapped in a blue cloak symbolising his humanity wrapped in divinity. The men who walked with him wear brown and green symbolising the earth and God's connection to man. The colour green announces life. The earthly colours heighten the meaning of the supernatural event.

Pilgrimage

Young Cleopas is wearing a scallop shell on his hat, symbol of a pilgrim.

Movement

Movement conveys their emotions, they are startled when they recognise Christ.

Their right hands move in harmony towards Christ.

The servant girl

The servant girl witnesses this moment of grace. Her innocent face is fixed on the face of the Lord, she too participates in this moment of extraordinary revelation, and believes. She becomes a disciple in this moment, recognising her Saviour.
